In 1969, the Northern Pike was designated the state fish. It can reach a length of four feet.



State Honorary Equine



In 1993, the Nokota Horse was designated the state marine honorary equine. Nokota horses live in the badlands of southwestern North Dakota.

State Insect



In 2011, the Green Lady
Beetle (ladybug) was
designated the state insect.

State Fruit



In 2007 Chokecherry was adopted as the state fruit. It grows

State Fossil

The Teredo was a worm-shaped mollusk related to modern clams, mussels, and oysters. It burrowed through trees growing near swamps in North Dakota.

















North Dakota State Tree: American Elm




North Dakota State Flower: Wild Prairie Rose
